A RUM OLD TRADE ...

John Stevenson at work. A cooper crafts barrels without using nails or glue - it's a dying art.

After 39 years spent perfecting his craft, John Stevenson, a short, wiry 55-year-old with blackened hands, has been asked to stop making wooden rum barrels.

Stevenson, one of the last of Sydney's coopers, attributes it to changing tastes and rising costs: "Australians just don't drink rum like they used to," he said. "At one time, everyone at the bar would order a schooner of beer and a rum chaser. Even the navy would include rum in its rations.

"It used to be the working man's drink but now it's more expensive than a nip of whisky."

This, and the advent of safer, more durable, stainless steel drums have led to Stevenson's retirement at the end of this month. He's now slowly converting his oak barrels into flowerpots.

Measuring well under 180 centimetres, Stevenson claims to be the shortest cooper in Australia - the trade usually calls for a large, strong build able to lift barrels weighing as much as 200 kilograms each.

A cooper is valued for his ability to craft a water-tight container from wooden staves and iron hoops without the use of nails or glue. He initials each one and, as time goes by, has to account for and repair any leaks.

Stevenson, who prefers to work with French or Persian oak, has handled at least a million barrels since he was first apprenticed as a cooper at the age of 16 at a Mascot brewery. "A million sounds a bit cocky, doesn't it?" he said, "Better say half a million."

Working in a brewery where he could sample alcohol at such an early age was "like putting a kid in an ice-cream shop," he said. These days, he does not drink at all.

His brother and brother-in-law also joined the trade at a time when there were 25 cooperages in Sydney, employing hundreds of men. At last count, Stevenson found only 20 coopers.

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"We'd be working in teams of seven men & we'd turn out 250 of the smaller barrels a day," he said. "Now it takes me a week to make one." The painstaking process of replacing a split stave can take him two to three days."

"Magical things happen inside an oak barrel, he said. "Wood takes the impurities out of alcohol and improves the flavour."
