

The JOURNAL - A MEMORABLE VOYALE continued

Saturday August 1st 1874. Set to & washed my duty clothes in the Morning. Fished off the Jib boom for Skip Jack & (Beneaters), caught a flying fish preserved the wings.

Sunday Lugust 2nd No Service. Blorious Weather every one who has been this journey before say they never knew such a passage as the present one, had a glorious plum pudding which the Cook made us, about 9 fed off it saw a fish called a "Thrasher" very like a whale.

Monday August 3rd Sited French Brigantine white hull, homeward bound did not signal her fished for Benito near here a dead calm about 11p.m.

Tuesday 4th Had a very early fall of rain or mist which lasted an hour cleared off, scorthching hot not a breath of wind lay in perfect calm — Legacy bad ship, caugh a B. for the first time must make a ? of it, had a very severe head ache best part of day saw a blackfish & several boneatos.

Wedneday Aug 5th 1874 Dot up with a severe cold, influenza which continued throughout the day saw doctor about 1/2 past 3 made an appointment to see him Thursday morning 1/2 past nine, several on board not well too. Master William Edward 18 years suffering from Rhumatism Miss Bell severe cold Mr Hook ditto, leg far from right — several on board saw a very large shark 13 feet long

6th Thursday Saw doctor about half past nine, got a bad cold, excessively hot all day saw several Black fish & porpoises.

Friday Aug 7th Cold no better no wind Log 116 South North 23 Lat West Edwards much better slept very stiff can only walk with some one each side of him, got "Scotty" to make me some porridge took it about eight had a good serving.

Saturday 15th Aug 1874 Crossed the line in the evening no shaving allowed.

Argument of jollification not only the Crew but Passengers as well singing & dancing & skipper ordered the third passenges below at 10 Oclock he did not seem to appreciate the singing etc Duvell Hadley & Meredith had their grog (stopped) Chips sent below. Spent a very jolly evening a regular party with Crawfiord Hadley Meredith Duvell "Chips", Bosun, Doctor Gladstone & myself. Grog etc

Sunday 16th August 1874 No Service. Dot every thing ready for a pudding which Doctor kindly made us; begin to seem a little dull as much of a muchness, no great change.

Monday 17th Aug Very squally weather had to about ship cannot get on the right course, sea dashing over the sides wetting every one, the decks constantly swamped in fact never dry.

Tuesday 18th Still very squally & sea running very high shipped a sea which came clean over the bulwarks and right into my cabin & then into berth swamped blanket pillow Gladstone & Chips happened to be inside they got a first rate soaking.

Wednesday 19th Aug 1874 Saw some large porpoises ahead the sailors tried to harpoon some of them but without success, a great change much better weather, than yesterday. Detting accustomed to seeing nothing but sea & sky from morning to night & night till morning not even a sail on the horizon for a Week, nothing of any excitement except (abouting) shuip which has taken place several times, fresh grog toward our destination & returning (back) to England.

Wedseday Aug 26th 1874 Still very fine weather sited the coast of Peru was about 6 p.m. saw several whales also an American barque homeward bound did not speak with her turned in at 4 Bells.

Thursday Aug 27th 1874 Turned to & washed several of my things saves expense & hel;ps to pass away the time, had a long yarn with Crawford in the afternoon about the climate.

Friday Lug 28th 1874 Nothing of any note

Saturday Aug 29th 1874 Frightfukl weather during the night. Could not sleep a wink the sea dashing clean over the bulwarks against our cabin the Forecastle was flooded out several of the sailors washed out of their bunks it was as much as I could do to Keep in my bunk for the rolling of the ship on of the sailors Moore was washed by a sea from the main nast to the Post harness a distance of some twenty yards or more, we shiped a sea over the forecastle, which smashed the skylight & bent an iron beam they say????? quantity of water in the deck every few minutes this continued all day more or less turned in about 3 Bells.

Sunday Aug 30th Quite a change just a wee gentle Breeze, just the usual routine, sea cchange.

Monday Lug 31 Nothing of any note.

CLONCORRICX


This privately owned Darling Point house was built in 1884 for George Bowen Simpson who was a leading lawyer & member of the Legislative Council. It was designed by the noted American architect John Horbury Hunt, whilst resident in Sydney. Hunt was quite a revolutionary rejecting the "frivolous" detailing of the then fashionable *Italianate* style.

It is believed that Cloncorrick pictured below, represents one of at most three surviving Horbury Hunt designed facebrick residences in Sydney. The three-storeyed house features red brickwork, chunky chimneys, false gable truss ends, unusual terracotta ornamentation & a beautifully executed stained glass window.

GLADSWOOD

Gladswood located at Double Bay was originally called Seaford House then Glenyarrah until receiving its current name in 1913. The house was constructed in 1856 from sandstone along picturesque *Gothic* lines, then the favoured style for the wealthy colonial clientele of whom the self-made man and Member of the Legislative Council, Samuel Deane Gordon would have been classed.

This house commanding highly esteemed water views was owned in recent timed by the entrepreneur Alan Bond. It is currently being converted into seven "luxury" apartments although great care is being taken not to alter the superb facade. A drawing of the house appears on the back page of the Bulletin.
