#### THE RON RATHBONE LOCAL HISTORY COMPETITION



Congratulations to the winners of the 2024 Ron Rathbone Local History Competition. The prize is significant for many reasons - for entrants there is \$6,000 awarded to the winner; the award provides a rich source of historical information that is made

available for the community; and it provides an avenue of research and publishing for historians. So start researching now for next year!

This year, Bayside Council held the award ceremony in the gardens at Lydham Hall on Saturday 26th October. The MC for the day was Deputy Mayor Heidi Lee Douglas and the awards were presented by the newly elected Mayor Edward McDougall. Councillor Liz Barlow gave a wonderful summary of the awards and why they are named after Ron Rathbone, former Councillor and Mayor of Rockdale Council.

The overall winner was Olga Sedneva for *Tempe: Change of purpose change of landscape.*

#### **RON RATHBONE - THE LEGACY LIVES ON**



The Ron Rathbone Local History Prize was established in 2006 in honour of Ron Rathbone OAM (1931-2007), a former teacher at Bexley Public School as well as former Mayor, Councillor and historian for Rockdale Council.

Rathbone set aside his own Council salary as prize money for the annual competition and, in the last year of his life, he used these funds to establish the Local History Prize to encourage the recording of local history for future generations.

Amongst his great contributions was the founding of the St George Historical Society in 1962 (with Rathbone as foundation secretary) and, in 1970, the purchase of Lydham Hall as a local history museum.

Ronald William Rathbone was born on the 9th October 1931. His family home, later his home, still stands at 53 Bruce Street Bexley. He went to Carlton Public School, the Kogarah intermediate High School and then Canterbury Boys High School. After high school, he trained to be a teacher at Balmain Teachers College.

During his adolescence he became fascinated with politics and as soon as he was old enough he joined the Young Liberals at Kogarah.

In 1959, at the age of 28, he ran for local council and, after a strong campaign, won a seat as an Alderman. At the next election in 1963, he had been elected deputy Mayor. And in 1968 he was elected as Mayor – a position he held for a record 4 terms.

Rathbone died in January 2007, a year after establishing the Ron Rathbone Local History Prize.







As well as his council activities, Ron taught at Bexley Primary School for 24 years and was involved with many organisations, including the Rockdale Municipal Orchestra and Opera Company, the Heritage Council of NSW, the Benevolent Society of NSW and the St George Historical Society.

In January 1967, Ron Rathbone was one of a small group of people who took the first unsponsored tourist trip to China since the communist takeover in 1949. His fascination with China remained with him his entire life.

In 1987 he was awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia for Service to Local Government which spanned over 40 years. He wrote more than 15 books and numerous articles on the history and heritage of our area.

Lydham Hall is currently hosting a small exhibition about Rathbone which includes a display of his medals. many of his books still in print are available for purchase.

#### **TEMPE HOUSE OPENING SEPTEMBER 2024**



The St George Historical Society organised a one off opening of Tempe House on the 14th September.

Tempe House is the magnificent 1830s villa built by colonial architect, <u>John Verge</u>, for Alexander Brodie Spark in the 1830's. The State Heritage listed house sits on the edge of the Cooks River at Wolli Creek and still retains a large area of greenery around it, including the Mount Olympus Gardens which retains vegetation typical of the era before settlement.

In 1884, the estate was sold to the <u>Good</u> <u>Samaritan Order</u> and was a home for

unmarried women and later a home for 'delinquent' girls. The Good Samaritan Order retained the property for 100 years until it was sold to Qantas in 1989 before finally being sold to Interciti Arncliffe Developments in 2000 and redeveloped into the high rise precinct we see today.









We had a wonderful visitor turn out, including one lady who regaled all in period costume. It was the first event using our new Society banner which was displayed at the entrance on a perfect Spring day. We also made substantial sales of the first copies of the new edition of the previously out-of-print *The Early History of Wolli Creek Valley.* 

A big thank you to the volunteers that helped make the September opening of the magnificent Tempe House a success. On the day our volunteers: Laurice Bondfield, Michael Drew, Wesley Fairhall, Brendan Giles, and Barry Johnson. And a special thank you to Bob and Laurel Horton for providing some excellent commentary on the history of the house.
